

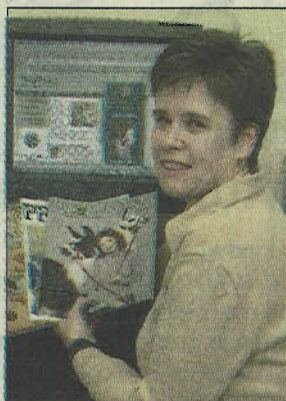

# Restaurants collaborate to aid charity

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Today, you need not feel guilty about turning your back on the Thanksgiving remnants lurking in your refrigerator. If you go to one of 14 Decatur restaurants today, they'll donate 2 percent of your tab to a hunger relief charity.

The restaurants have donated a percentage of Thursday receipts throughout November. The money is part of a pool gathered by the city of Decatur for the Heifer Project International. Decatur was the first municipality in the world to fund a Heifer "ark," or \$5,000 worth of farm animals. The project sends the arks to an impoverished family in one of 45 countries.

Heifer Project officials said restaurants in no other town have banded together in such a fashion.

"It's quite something," said Hilary Smith, the project's Southeast director. She has asked volunteers in the seven Southeastern states under her

direction to take the idea to other cities.

Previously, most donated arks came from churches, Smith said.

The ark is a reference to the boatful of animals saved by the biblical figure Noah to repopulate the world after an angry God flooded the earth. Each Heifer Project ark includes chicks, sheep, rabbits, beehives, guinea pigs, llamas, camels, donkeys, goats, oxen, cows, ducks, water buffaloes and geese.

Heifer Project is a Little Rock-based charity started by World War II veterans haunted by the devastation they had witnessed in France.

Impoverished people are trained in animal husbandry and then given farm animals. They are required to pass along their animals' offspring to others in similar circumstances.

Decatur donated its first ark last year. This year, a citizens group wants to raise \$15,000 by year's end for three more arks.

Robert Soens, a Decatur builder, helped organize the ark campaign after he received a catalogue from Heifer Project in the mail last year. He said he had never heard of the organization but liked what he read.

That reaction is typical, Smith said. "It's the idea of self-reliance they like," she said. "As more people find out about it, more people respond."

Participating Decatur restaurants are: Atlantic Star, Brickstore Pub, Cafe Alsace, Cafe Lily, Corky Dean, Eddie's Attic, Johnny's New York-Style Pizza, Maui Taco, Mosaic, Our Way Cafe, Pastries A-Go Go, Raging Burrito, Santa Fe Cafe and Sweet Melissa's.
